BAPTISMS.—Enquiries regarding baptism should be made to Mr. Shaw. A fortnight's notice is normally desired and it is particularly requested that arrangements for baptism are not made before Mr. Shaw has been consulted. Mr. Shaw is always glad to prepare adults for baptism with a view to confirmation.

A **CHILDREN'S SERVICE** for children 4-8 is held on Sunday mornings (except 1st Sunday when there is a Family Service in Church) at 11 a.m. in the Hall.

THE CHOIR hold their practice on Friday, 7.30 p.m. Boys 8.0 p.m. Full. We are always glad to welcome new members.

CLERGY.—Mr. Shaw will gladly see those needing spiritual counsel. Appointments can be made by telephone or after any of the Church services.

Editorial

AMBASSADORS FOR CHRIST

Well, here it is! A new journal for Maybury, launched by the parish church of the district, St. Paul's. Month by month we shall bring to you news of people and events especially connected with this area.

The "Messenger" seemed to be the right title for two reasons. First, it suggests a figure familiar to all of us and not restricted to any one particular age or country. There always have been messengers. Marco Polo, who visited China in the 13th Century, described how mounted couriers would change horses by leaping from saddle to saddle without dismounting. The famous Greek, Pheidippides ran the 150 miles between Athens and Sparta in 48 hours before the Battle of Marathon in 490 B.C. Professional messengers were widely used in Europe in the Middle Ages, and even in modern times, with all our advanced methods of communication, the human messenger still plays his part.

This was particularly true of war years when men and women would risk everything in order to get the message through. Today, the corps of the Queen's messengers with their special badge travel by passenger airways carrying their "diplomatic bag." The messenger, then, is an indispensable factor in every age.

Secondly, it is the message that gives rise to the messenger. Important though the messenger be, the message is far more so. Often messages have had to be concealed in ingenious ways. On one occasion at least during the last war, valuable papers were stitched inside a chicken! But then early in the 16th Century Bibles had to be smuggled into England in bags of flour and bales of Flanders cloth.

Now we need make no secret of the fact that this magazine sets out to be a messenger. It carries a message—the good news of the Christian Faith. It is this, we believe, that will make it worth reading, that will keep it fresh and topical and full of interest. For rightly presented the truth that God has done something for men and women through Jesus Christ can never fail to arouse interest. "Call this dull," writes Dorothy Sayers in "Man Born to be King," "then what in heaven's name do you call exciting?"

Our policy and our aim is to bring as a messenger in modern garb using modern terminology this timeless and universal message to the people of Maybury. And while we set the message against the background of our own district, we do not forget that it is one which we share with other Christian Churches in Woking and that it is God's solution to the problems facing the world at large.

Livermore who has seven Sunday Schools in his parish says: "Nothing but good can come from the use of this excellent series." What do you think? Come and see for yourself, remembering the old saying "It's never too late (or early) to learn."

These meetings are by no means intended only for Sunday School Teachers, or prospective teachers, but they are a golden opportunity to learn, or maybe, be given a wider vision of what might be done amongst the boys and girls of our parish.

We need teachers in all departments of our Sunday Schools, men and women who can say with conviction, "I know WHOM I have believed" and who, are trained to communicate the vital truths of the gospel to boys and girls, who may never hear it, except from their lips.

For Your Reading!

TO MY SON Dale Evans Rogers (Revell 12'6)

This book consists of a collection of letters by Dale Evans, wife of Roy Rogers the well-known cowboy of films and television. All the letters are addressed to her son Tom who was wonderfully used by God to lead his mother to Christ. The letters are full of a real, fervent knowledge of Christ the Saviour and are a record of many years spent in His service. Many of them are delightful to read and show how wonderfully the Saviour strengthens and encourages those who trust in Him.

Having said this it is only fair to add that one feels that this book is intended for American readers being written in, what is sometimes called, American Evangelistic style or Chromium-plated evangelism.

The authoress appears, to our minds, to have some rather naïve ideas about America and its people; at times Christianity and The American Way of Life are made to appear synonymous. Our ideas of America which comes from books, newspapers, cinema and modern music, do not often agree with the ideas put forward by this book. One quotation will serve to illustrate this: "We plan to—introduce the children one by one and have them say the American Pledge of Allegiance, with choral response from the Sons of the Pioneers, with Roy and me singing the second verse and chorus of "America the Beautiful." Then Roy and I will give a short talk on the importance of faith in God and spiritual education for children. Naturally, the emphasis is on Christianity because this is primarily a Christian nation, and we feel that Christianity has made our nation what it is." (Page 99).

Nevertheless it is a book full of Christ and His love and power over a family and the great influence of that family on people around them because of the Spirit of Christ within them.
